COMMENT GUEST SPEAKER Megan Moore (NOAA)	Guest Speaker: Megan Moore (NOAA) - Impacts of the Hood Canal Bridge on migrating steelhead and potential solutions to address them  Steelhead smolt mortality and behavior at the Hood Canal Bridge Steelhead threatened in Puget Sound, with a decline in marine survival since 1990s. Recovery of listed species is a mandate of NOAA Fisheries.  Acoustic telemetry has been used to track the migration of juvenile steelhead through Puget Sound  Receivers placed through the migration path Record of individual fish migration and survival  Timeline of steelhead early marine research 2006-2010 used acoustic telemetry to measure steelhead survival 2007 Puget Sound steelhead listed as threated under ESA 2013 published a paper about the impact of the Hood Canal Bridge (HCB) on steelhead survival HCB extends 15 ft under water surface Steelhead migrate close to surface and the bridge acts as a barrier		

- Smolts spent more time at receiver arrays at the bridge, were detected on more receivers, and showed more mortality than all other arrays along their migration path
- 2016 nonprofit Long Live the Kings secured funding from the SRFB and WA State to conduct inter-disciplinary research at the HCB
  - o steelhead survival and behavior (NOAA)
  - o water quality (PNNL)
  - o hydroacoustics (PGST)
  - o predator surveys (WDFW)
  - o light/noise effects (PGST/PNNL)
- 2017-2018 tagged 500 steelhead over 2 years from Skokomish River and Big Beef Creek
- Installed extensive receiver arrays at the bridge and added an array at Twin Spits
- o Predator identification using tags with depth sensors
- 2017 and 2018, ~50% of fish that made it to the HCB did not make it past
- Steelhead spent 1-2 days at the HCB, a significant amount of time (total migration from river to Strait of Juan de Fuca was only 12-16 days)
- Mortalities distributed around the bridge, Sisters Rock, Port Gamble Bay
- Predators appeared to target high densities of fish in corners of the bridge structure
- Harbor seals are likely the most significant predator
- Predation occurred along the entire length of the bridge, usually during the day
- Steelhead cross under or around the bridge usually on an ebb tide (rarely on a flood tide)

#### Structural Modifications Testing

In 2021, the Assessment Team began working with an engineering firm to design modifications to improve passage and survival

- 2023-2024, testing modifications on steelhead survival and predator behavior
- We will be testing a fillet fish guidance structure on the bridge that will fill in the corner pontoon
  - Structure made of HDPE piping framework, geomembrane around to keep debris and animals out, will weigh 68,000 lbs
  - o 60 ft x 60 ft x 85 ft triangle
  - Control/treatment block experimental design structure will be attached to the bridge and removed on alternating weeks during steelhead migration

#### Adult Salmon Research

In 2022 we began an adult behavior tagging study on adult Chinook and Chum

- Goal is to assess whether the bridge alters migration and survival of adult salmon returning to spawning grounds in Hood Canal
- Captured, tagged, and released 7 adult Chinook and 113 chum salmon

This project presents a unique opportunity to bring together fisheries managers and conservationists from Tribes, the state, and federal entities

#### Discussion

Gordon: Have you looked at the structure of the old bridge? Impact of the old vs new bridge, since replacement in 2009?

 Megan: Replacement of the east half was similar design, heard that it is a little deeper than it used to be. Don't have specifications on how different it is. In 2009, east half of the bridge was being replaced, and there was much less steelhead mortality that year during the tagging study (half of the bridge was gone/open for fish passage).

Carol: What month is it that the fillets are going to go in and out? When the steelhead come back to spawn, are the fillets going to go to the opposite side of the bridge?

Megan: April is when the Big Beef Creek smolts start migrating past the bridge. The study will start in April and go through the middle of May (6 weeks). Adult study results will determine future actions. We only have funding for one fillet in 2023, hoping to get funding for a second in 2024. Future studies using the fillets are possible, but we are waiting to analyze data regarding adult behavior and passage at the bridge. 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	Joan: First graph showing the steelhead mortality trends – where is that information from?  • Megan: Published paper - Kendall did an analysis of all steelhead survival from wild and hatchery populations, compared Puget Sound to Salish Sea.  Bob: Will the structures only be in during the study period? Are other marine organisms also getting eaten due to the barrier effect?  • Megan: Yes, structures will only be in place during study period. They will be stored in Seabeck during the study period on the control weeks of the study. Very likely that other organisms are being preyed upon at the bridge. Port	
	Gamble S'Klallam Tribe has done research on impacts to juvenile Chinook and chum salmon. Marine mammal biologists have talked about the bridge being a deterrent to whales. Migrating species, especially surface-oriented species, are likely the most affected.	
	Brenda: Pigeon guillemot surveys were conducted on the bridge for the first time this year. Some days, numbered in the hundreds. Predation by birds?  • Megan: Pigeon guillemots are a major predator at the bridge. I don't know if they would typically dive to such depths so frequently (as the tags with depth sensors were indicating). It's not out of the question, but data from tags provides more evidence for predation by harbor seals.	
	Judy: The pontoons extend 15 ft below the surface. At what depth is it a barrier, versus something that fish will pass under?  Megan: Tags with depth transmitters show that most detections of steelhead were within the top 6 feet of the water column. That's the normal depth range for steelhead. We don't know for other species what the migration depth looks like.

Cannot - replace official entities or authority they bring

- take pictures of pollution and potential issues before securing/leaving the scene

#### Questions

Gordon: How is your organization funded? Stone: I'm self-funded. There are some resources available, Salish Rescue is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. We are mainly working on donations

Solenne: What is your best advice to boaters to stay off the beach? How do we reach more boaters?

Stone: It's rare that boaters don't want to communicate and interact with other people, especially in unfamiliar waters. I've only had two bad experiences talking to people on their boats. If someone is under anchored, I will say something. New technology doesn't substitute for local knowledge and

Sarah: Do people sign up for Salish Rescue?

Libby: Wer're a local 501(c)(3), all volunteer effort with no paid staff. We get dispatched from 911 and Coast Guard.

Brenda: You do a lot of hands-on work approaching boats on the water, but for those of us who want to contribute to your educational campaign what would you recommend? Do you teach skills classes?

Libby: We have taught at Wooden Boat Festival and we have taught classes for high school students. We have an upcoming course for middle school students. I would like to do more hands-on things in the future, for example with yacht clubs.

Brenda: What's the best way to reach tourist boaters?

Libby: Tourist boaters are less of the problem, mostly because they are here in the summer in good weather. We have had problems with casual kayakers going past the Point Wilson lighthouse.

Carol: I've been teaching about anchoring and boat safety/operations for forty years and I know many of you have been as well. How do we make certain that anyone who buys and operates a boat is licensed to do so, and has the skills to be safe on the water?

Stone: Not a bad idea to include basic training with boater's license, similar to a driver's license training. Other than the occasional tow, we don't deal with many people with boater's licenses in the first place. There are a lot of people who are working remotely/living aboard boats since the pandemic began; there are a lot of free boats out there which encourages inexperienced boaters.

Solenne: WA State does require the boater education card for boaters, though woefully remiss at enforcing that. I'm wondering about how we can talk with WA State Parks and those that can enforce the boater education card. I know there are a lot of boaters on the water who don't even know there is a requirement to get the boater education card. Libby: Tying that to boater registration would help, but a lot of people don't have a registration for their boat either. There are

	a lot of people who use boats for inexpensive housing. I think the bulk of derelict vessel issues come from this group.

GUEST SPEAKER Dr. Tarang Khangaonkar, PNW National Laboratory: "Shoreline Resolving Version of the Salish Sea Model (SSMHR) & Flushing and Residence Computations"	Dr. Tarang Khangaonkar, Program Manager at Pacific Northwest National Laboratory (PNNL)  Salish Sea Model History -first funding was through NWSC, 15 years ago -used to be called Puget Sound model -initial funding allowed us to show the value of this tool -model was developed to be used, not only for the purpose of doing research – it was developed to be a practical tool  Model development -hypoxia concerns and fish kills in Hood Canal 2000-2010 -needed a full scale model of Puget Sound to resolve dissolved oxygen issues -hydrodynamic model FVCOM (tides, currents, salinity, temperature, etc.) -water quality model FVCOM-ICM (nutrients, carbon, algae, detritus, zooplankton, larvae, DO pH, toxics, sediments, etc.)		

-domain encompasses Salish Sea to continental shelf in the Pacific Ocean

Need for a regional high resolution operational and forecasting model

Objective of NOAA IOOS Grant 2018, accurate real-time predictions for maritime emergency response (e.g., oil spills) -prediction of harmful algal blooms

-daily projection and five-day forecast

#### New mode

- -grid refinement that captures nearshore and intertidal regions -model predictions used to locate boat that sank near San
- Juan Islands and plane that crashed in 2022
- -model forced using NOAA products
- -NOAA ran a project from 2015-2017 deploying ADCPs at stations around Puget Sound collecting current profiles, as well as salinity and temp
- -passed NOAA skill assessment requirements
- -model validation using tidal ellipses
- -oil spill prediction model expected to be operational for NOAA in 2024
- -animations are uploaded to PNNL YouTube channel

#### **Evaluating Transport Time Scales**

- -residence time (time that a water parcel spends in an area of interest)
- -flushing time (time taken for an area to return to clean conditions if there was contamination)
- -published values of flushing time for basins
- -poor mixing in certain basins

#### Questions

Gordon: How much of the bathymetry of WA coast is in the model?

Tarang: Bathymetry information at the vertices of each triangle in the domain of the model.

Carol: What is the Central Basin? What is open ocean boundary – shelf?

Tarang: Boundary at the shelf was selected after trial and error at getting the model to work properly. We found that as tides cross the continental shelf there is complex mixing. If boundary is set off shelf, it would need to go far, which is a large

computational burden. So, we chose a bathymetric contour at ~300 meter at the continental shelf.

Central Basin is defined as Admiralty Inlet sill near Hansville to

Tacoma Narrows.

Glenn: At what remaining concentration is a basin considered flushed?

Tarang: Flushing time follows an exponential curve, mathematically never reaches zero. Must define preset concentration. Flushed when it reaches that value (1/e). 37% of initial concentration (arbitrary value).

Brent: What is the resolution of bathymetric data in the model, and what is the source?

Tarang: Varies by region. Within Puget Sound, we have some that is 10m resolution from NOAA. Model grid cell size varies from 100m to 200m or more (matches grid resolution, eg at the shelf 3 km).

Jeff: Meteorological forecast – does that include storm surge? Can you see eddies with this tool?

Tarang: When the model is operational, or doing hindcasting, it will be included into the model. Yes, eddies are visible in the model. You can see fronts going by as well.

Glenn: Could the model be run on a PC with a good GPU? Tarang: Regular SSM – takes about 8 hours to run one year simulation using 96 processors in parallel. We started the Salish Sea Modeling Center in Seattle at University of Washington for anyone who wants to run the model (get an account, help to run the model). It's meant for researchers, students in the area to use the model without being hindered by computing needs.

Bob: Will the model be publicly accessible once it is operational?

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	Tarang: Operational model means there will be a prediction for the day and a five-day forecast. That information will be calculated by NOAA/data will be accessible through NOAA.		
	Emily: I'm curious if you have any applications of the model that you are personally excited about?  Tarang: Any unsolved problem is exciting. Fecal coliform bacteria project with PIC, help to determine what bacterial issues are caused by loading vs water movement, wind, etc. Another project – PCBs in fish tissue. WDFW and others have been working on contaminated sites (superfund sites, cleaned up and capped). PCBs are still detected in fish tissue. Hypothesis that PCBs are entering the water, absorbed by phytoplankton, and entering the food web. Building a PCB model to establish model of PCBs in food chain. Invasive European green crab – building an individual based model of green crab larvae to predict the spread of green crab into Puget Sound. How quickly and where are they likely to go?		
	Nam: I'm curious if the model is periodically updated with new data, thinking of changes in climate/water temps and other changing parameters?  Tarang: Yes, Dept of Ecology maintains monthly monitoring program that is continuously collecting data that is incorporated into the model.		
	Nam: There was an earthquake in the Pacific last year that resulted in a tsunami watch along the west coast. I observed very compressed tidal cycle and unusual currents while in the water during that day, is that something that can be factored into the model and run to see the effects?  Tarang: It can be, we haven't looked at that specific event. We would need to go back and rerun it. It would start at the continental shelf boundary – we don't have sensors at the boundary. So it would have to be included in the Global HICOM model; if detected, we would have already seen it.

I remember talking about hiring another full-time staff person.  Jeff: With just one staff, if we are adding new projects, we need to add more staff capacity.  Monica: Will work on the budget and determine if we can hire an assistant more than part time.  Project Review Forage Fish Spawning Surveys: - Goal to monitor spawning seasonally at Fort Townsend for five years post-restoration (fall 2016) - MRC has collected data for 7 years now - Point No Point Treaty Council interested in continued data collection at Fort Townsend - Will continue monitoring Fort Townsend during peak months of Oct-Dec through 2025 and monthly at WDFW Index sites (Disco Bay, Dabob Bay)		

- Interest in adding sites; will see if WDFW or others have capacity for processing samples for new sites

#### Bull Kelp Monitoring:

- North Beach monitoring started 7 years ago (July 2016)
   Will continue monitoring as part of the regional long term data collection effort
- Plan to conduct linear extent surveys to assess bull kelp across East Jeff Co
- Plan to use the Salish Sea Model to add to understanding of the PT sewer outfall effluent circulation
- Consider hiring contractor to analyze satellite data, or purchasing software to analyze

#### Storm Surge Monitoring:

- 7 years of data, one year of monitoring as MRC
- Currently hiring an intern to help develop the protocol
- Will continue to develop this project

#### Olympia Oyster Restoration:

- Goal to re-establish Olympia oyster population in Disco Bay and at least one other local bay
- Will continue to monitor annually and spread shell as needed
- Consider next steps with Kilisut Harbor

There was discussion about limiting activities or exploring alternative substrates with the limited supply of cultch.

#### Rain Gardens:

- Initial goal to install one to two rain gardens each year, and maintain established network
- To date, 17 rain gardens (12 in PT, 3 in Quilcene, 2 in PH); will be adding 2 more this year
- Currently hiring an intern to begin rain garden stewardship
- Will shift to maintenance

#### Eelgrass/Shellfish Protection Voluntary No-Anchor Zones:

- Goal to protect three eelgrass and shellfish habitat areas
- Will continue maintenance and monitoring
- Plan to assess existing eelgrass data and determine need to fill data gaps
- Will look into adding 1 new buoy between the ferry and Boat Haven in existing no-anchor zone along Port Townsend

#### ROV Derelict Crab Pot Removal:

- Goals to engage STEM students in marine conservation, remove derelict crab pots from our marine waters, and focus on areas not targeted by other removal efforts
- Currently planning for side scan sonar and ROV removal in PT Bay as a relatively safe area we can continue to develop methods
- Will continue to develop ROV capability and plan to later focus on areas other than PT Bay (adding Dabob and Quilcene to existing list)

#### Education and Outreach:

- Goal to engage public in marine education and stewardship
- Will continue existing efforts: speaker series, tabling festivals, digging for dinner, searching for seaweed, crabber outreach, shoreline landowner outreach
- Will explore effectiveness of Clallam MRC's coasters and consider for crabber outreach

Heidi: Another staff person would be very helpful for education and outreach efforts – develop and host events, do outreach, coordinate volunteers, etc.

Bob: Education needed for potential derelict vessel owners how do we reach people to avoid vessels becoming derelict?

#### Derelict Vessel Resources:

- Goal to figure out how to best work on this issue and direct folks to the right resources for different scenarios
- First educate the MRC collect and distill all informational resources, e.g., create guidelines to understand what to do in various scenarios
- Plan to create a project webpage on MRC website
- Plan to source or create a brochure to distribute with key
- Consider organizing a workshop to educate boaters

Brenda: Solenne sent the derelict vessel committee an informative email. She is a great resource for all of that. PSP Action Agenda Strategy 17 is for responsible boating – also addresses all these things. Need to find out what others have been/are doing and draw on those resources. I'm not sure the MRC is the right place for this project.

Carol: If the MRC had its own vessel and could deliver information about responsible boat ownership, anchoring, etc. to boaters on the water, we would be more effective at reaching people that may not have the skills to keep a vessel in safe working condition (that may not come to safety workshops).

Heidi: We talked about reaching out to Snohomish and San Juan MRC that are doing derelict vessel programs. It would be great if we could make a webpage that had derelict vessel resources that would direct people to the correct places- focus on accessibility and availability of information.

Joan: Would it be better to have it on the Jeff Co webpage? More people would see it.

Nam: Opportunities to work with Salish Rescue? We could help them by producing educational resources for them to hand out to boaters on the water.

Betsy: We should collaborate with other MRCs so that we have consistent messaging to boaters.

Consensus: Need more discussion and research on this topic

#### Plans for Moving Forward with MRC Projects

Derelict Vessel Resources:

- Do research for creating educational materials
- Put money toward developing materials (printing, website, staff time)

- Ben (contractor that conducted the side scan sonar) had a NOAA grant to clean up Sequim and Disco Bay; Hires divers to remove pots, but future is using ROVs

#### Forage fish sampling -

Jeff – I sampled on May 31st at Adelma Beach Sarah – I sampled last month in Dabob.

#### Derelict vessel removal (Sarah) -

- May 31st, sailboat on Kala Point was removed
- June 5<sup>th</sup>, vessel recycling event in Port Townsend. Ocean rowing vessel removed by DNR (John Robert Hansen).
  - History: Boat was rowed across the Atlantic, set a record. Supported by Starcraft Navigation School in Ballard. Boat rowed back across the ocean, collected scientific data the whole way. Boat capsized, crew rescued, boat retrieved and put in the Sea Port Museum in Tacoma. Museum decided not to maintain anymore. Hauled beer to the R2AK Ruckus and was then demolished/recycled in Port Townsend.
- Solenne: DNR tagged Cardeis for derelict vessel removal

#### No-anchor zones (Troy) -

- Last month, PT buoys were put out. Everything looks good. Weekly updates on boater compliance in pictures from Frank.

#### Olympia oyster restoration (Neil) -
