GRANT PROJECT UPDATES	FORAGE FISH (Sarah) Sampled last weekend at Dabob & Quilcene on Friday, 5/30  OLYMPIA OYSTERS (Neit) Discovery Bay & Killisut Harbor 1000 bags were emptied last Tuesday, 5/27 in Discovery Bay A European Green Crab was caught – 88mm Total of 2500 bags put out this year There was discussion re: concerns of European Green Crab eating Olympia Oysters  Tim & Neil met with Port Ludlow resident Peter Joseph –met him at Port Ludlow (down by the Totem Pole) at the Pacific Oyster bed. Neil did not see any evidence of Olympia Oysters there. They went to the end of Picnic Point, there was a nice beach that had seepage on it, there is potential for a small-scale restoration of Olympia Oysters there. They may do a survey of the entire Port Ludlow area, but Neil's guess is that the area may have been excavated/logged in the past. He is intrigued with the site. This is a question for WDFW – Port Ludlow may be in the same genetic area as Killisut. He's not sure of the permitting. # OTHER MRC PROJECTS

- Potential maintenance workday sometime next month. Date unspecified yet, but it will happen.
- Gordon said they need Bryan to help with the GPS
- Jon W asked if they see someone anchored in eel grass buoys should they notify someone?
  - O Sarah suggested to take a picture.
  - Carol suggested talking to Kristian, the Harbormaster. He was going out to anchored boats and was leaving material with them re: derelict vehicle's etc. but she wasn't sure how often
  - O Jon said he would talk to the boat operator.
  - Gordon asked if we have a compelling pamphlet to give to people. Jeff mentioned that NWSC has a pamphlet available – New Anchor Out campaign
  - Katie said compliance is voluntary
  - O Jon said he was mainly interested in the guidelines.
  - Katie suggested taking a photo and sending it to her, and they'll keep it as part of MRC records.
  - Betsy said it makes sense to get the Eelgrass brochures to the Port so they have something to give out.
  - Frank said it was rare to see someone inside the Eelgrass buoys.

## ROV CRAB POTS (Jeff, Tim B.) see above

- Jeff showed slides of the ROV trip.
  - Cockpit with four monitors (two were laptops) showing different views.
  - Jon W shared how one pot was surrounded by kelp, but showed up in sonar very clear. Operator was able to pick it right up.
  - ROV has a grappling hook worth \$1000. It's a very expensive ROV.
- They had grant money, so they decided to hire Ben Griner who has ROV experience, Tim B was the co-lead. And then they got the Robotics Club. They had students every day.
   Jason Morgan came out—was an educational event for him.
- Gordon asked about the current
  - Jeff said the ROV is fine, but the tether has a lot of drag. It works in bad weather, but the divers can't.
  - On Saturday, the weather was too windy for professional divers.
- Everyone that came out was able to fly it.
- The ROV went 25-30 meters deep, the deepest was PT Bay
- Couldn't go to Discovery Bay because of the weather.
- They got 37 pots total.
- Jeff said that figuring out what to do with the pots is another project.
- Emily: Do you submit data out to anyone?
  - o Jeff: WFDW, MRC, Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe
- Gordon: How much did the day cost?
  - Katie gave the total cost of the project at about \$23000
  - o The insurance was \$1200 per day
- Carol shared that she was impressed at how professional Ben & Mike were. The ROV arm broke two times, but they were very patient. He had great communication with students. Very enthusiastic about everything.
- Jeff said this is an ongoing project and other MRC's are interested in this work. He showed the stack of pots they retrieved.

- Tim B. said at one point they lost the ability to find where the ROV was (that device had broken). They only had sonar to find it. The sonar on the ROV costs about \$11,000, so it is pretty affordable.
- Jeff shared that Ben Griner is working to get a communitybased grant. We lose about 12,000 pots per year, Jason finds about 1,000 per year. He may get a grant because of the environmental impact.
- Jon said this could be a great opportunity to involve high schools and the Maritime Academy. The Tribes could also be involved.
  - Gordon suggested that maybe the community could get a boat that could be shared by various organizations.
- · Betsy asked if there were any student comments.
  - Akeyla said that everyone she talked to loved it.
  - Jon shared that two freshmen who came on Friday were very shy at first, but by the end were almost fighting over driving it.
- Tim mentioned that Ben Griner said this becomes a maintenance thing if it happens every year. Then it becomes a small project, rather than a huge project.
  - Ben showed Tim all of the targets in Sequim & Discovery Bay...there are thousands of them.
  - o 7,000 in just Sequim Bay.
- Carol asked if chemicals from tires was an issue.
  - Betsy & Neil said it was produced from UV and wear of the tires (on the ground).
